CFS Report

Over the last few years, the UMGSA has become increasingly wary of the Canadian Federation of Students (CFS) and its subsidiary the Canadian Federation of Students Services (CFSS), as well as its provincial branch, the Canadian Federation of Students Manitoba (CFS-M). From the awful Health and Dental plan that they sold us (via UMSU) to their general disregard for our input on the organization and their strong Ontario bias at the federal level, the CFS, CFS-M and CFSS have not done much to warrant the ~\$60,000 a year that we send them. However, the UMGSA has tolerated this because we believe in a national student movement, which is what this corporation sells. Also, the CFS had a vested interest in convincing UMSU to put through the autonomy agreement, as UMSU was previously not forwarding checks to the CFS on behalf of the GSA (to be fair, we are not really members of the CFS [cf. President's Year End Report, 2001-2002], so it is not as if UMSU wasn't acting responsibly at the time). We generally believed the CFS to be a fairly inert entity, but this has rapidly changed.

On October 19th, 2009, the University of Manitoba Graduate Students' Association (UMGSA) became aware of an "Education Action Plan" lobbied to government on our behalf by the CFS that sought to tax graduate student income. Andy Bonar, President of UMGSA, immediately contacted the CFS via listserv and requested an apology from the document's authors for having signed our name to a document that we did not support (nor had we even seen it before it was lobbied). He was told that the document was "informed by other positions" that the CFS held, as outlined in the document "Money Does Matter" (available for free online; \$50.00 for a print copy). However, "Money Does Matter" does not include any mention of the elimination of the tax-free status of graduate student research money (the summary charts from each document are attached). Having reviewed the document, it is abundantly clear that the "Education Action Plan" is indeed not merely "informed" by "Money Does Matter", but is actually a recycled lobby effort that's only real difference is the attack on graduate students.

We sent Trish Kelley, Mohamed Moustafa, Aaron Glenn and Andy Bonar to the 2009 CFS Annual General Meeting with the hopes that we could get some answers to our questions and see some progressive changes made to the corporation.

When the "Education Action Plan" was brought up for discussion at the National Graduate Caucus by the University of Calgary Graduate Students' Association, it was immediately dismissed and we were fed the above line about the document being "informed by past positions". This refrain proved to be a strong mantra as the meeting progressed, as all caucuses and subcommittees repeated it whenever questioned about how it was developed, and why the graduate student locals were not consulted.

The majority of the main meeting centered on a reform package for the CFS that was put forward by the McGill PGSS, which included many important reforms such as the implementation of a Conflict of Interest Policy, and several other important changes to increase transparency in both the CFS and its subsidiary the CFSS. In response to the multitude of schools (13) attempting to defederate from the CFS, Carleton University's

graduate students' association (who is attempting to block their undergraduate students association [the very first members of the CFS] from holding a defederation vote) put forward a motion to double the required percentage of students signing the petition necessary to hold a referendum from 10% to 20%, to limit the number of referenda occurring across the country at the same time to two, and to increase the minimum number of years between referenda held at a school from three to five. The majority of these motions were referred to the Organization and Services Development (OSD) committee. We were, by luck of the draw (literally) and against the wishes of the provincial component of the CFS (who clearly did not see the value of having the only graduate students association in the province on the committee) able to get one representative (Trish Kelley) onto the provincial voting component of that committee. The other two positions went to an undergraduate executive from the University of Manitoba Students' Union (UMSU) and a staff member from the Brandon University Students' Union (BUSU). While we were initially upset about the exclusion of our elected members and the inclusion of a staff member, it became clear when talking to members from other schools that the "stacking" of committees was a common occurrence.

This became abundantly clear when the National Graduate Caucus (NGC) elected delegates to sit on the OSD committee: two of the three delegates were not graduate students – they were graduate school dropouts who were working as staff members for student unions in Ontario. Moreover, all of the delegates the NGC sent to the OSD committee were from Ontario.

The horrible part about the lack of graduate student representation, as well as the lack of concern for graduate student issues, is that graduate student issues are Federal issues and thus the existence of a federal group to represent those issues is necessary (why we have supported the CFS in the past). Ironically, graduate issues and treaty issues are the only explicitly federal education issues, and the NGC and Aboriginal Caucus both meet at the same time at the end of the day (usually around 11pm). Aaron Glenn has repeatedly asked that this not occur, but there has been no effort to change this on the past of the corporation.

To make matters worse, the task of the OSD committee was only to make recommendations on the motions (a seemingly nonsense task until it is revealed that the real purpose is to stack the committee and then attempt to convince non-committee members that the recommendations of the committee should be adopted without debate). The Manitoba delegation operated in such a manner as to eliminate any discussion about how we were voting on any motions. The dynamics of the delgation were such that our member Trish Kelley had to excuse herself from the committee (which at this point, given the sheer number of CFS/student union staff members on the committee, was a seemingly senseless committee). This turned out to be a good thing, as we needed to find Trish a new room to stay in (she had been placed with a non-student CFS member), as safety had become an issue (see next paragraph). The OSD committee met until 6:30 the following morning, which, arguably, limited the members' abilities to make rational arguments or make sense of the changes being made to motions or the language

contained in most of the motions. While these committees typically end at predetermined times, and any motions not dealt with at the committee level go to the plenary without committee recommendations, it was apparent that the committee was forced to go through all motions to limit the debate at the plenary – the first motion put to the plenary by a delegate was to omnibus the recommendations of the OSD committee, despite the varying levels required for a majority vote on the motions (50% vs. 2/3).

A major problem with the CFS meeting is the lack of ability for individuals or locals with dissenting opinions to voice their concerns. On more than one occasion at the meeting members of UMGSA were told that we were not there to represent the concerns of graduate students. Given that we were having such a hard time getting our concerns heard, the UMGSA, with the support of a number of schools from Quebec, sought out any available forum in which we could voice these concerns. Aaron Glenn ran for National Chairperson, Andy Bonar ran for National Deputy Chair person and Trish Kelley ran for National Treasurer so that we could use the ten minutes allotted for election speeches to address the concerns we saw with the corporation (CFS). In our election speeches we spoke out against the Carleton motion, the private (and political) interests that were controlling the corporation, and the general disregard for individual students.

It gets worse: Following the elections forum, Trish Kelley was verbally threatened by another delegate at the conference. She discussed this with the Harassment Officer, but her concerns were dismissed. Trish Kelley, Mohamed Moustafa, and Andy Bonar were also verbally accosted by a CFSS staff member; the harassment advisor informed us that she was not there to hear complaints about staff members.

When closing plenary finally rolled around, there was an immediate motion to reject all the motions put forward by schools from Quebec, a motion to accept all the committee recommendations without debate and, though the speaker's list was limited to two for and two against, multiple motions to call the question (which is supposed to be used only when debate is unproductive and is not to be used, as employed time and again at CFS meetings, in order to stop someone from speaking). Fortunately, the chair did not entertain these ridiculous and childish acts. Unfortunately, she did accept a vote of two-thirds that failed to receive two-thirds of the members voting and present in order to pass the Carleton motion. When this motion was illegally carried, we and another six or so schools walked out of the meeting in protest. While "walk-outs" are promoted by the CFS as a political tool for dissent, we were named-called and cussed at as we left (demonstrating the general childishness and lack of understanding on the part of a good many of the people affiliated with the CFS)

And this is what it boils down to: The CFS/CFSS is a multinational corporation (with holdings in both Canada and the United States) that sells multiple "services" to students—from cell phone plans to water bottles to health insurance to Travel Cuts promotions—but does not sustain itself through its sales (Travel Cuts alone loses in the millions). Rather, the CFS funds its corporate branch (CFSS) through mandatory, nonnegotiable fees levied to all students (regardless of income, interest, or political

allegiance) registered at universities with which it has a partnership (generally via student associations). It then brands itself (the CFS) as representing the "Student Movement®", which clearly ought not to be aligned with a corporation that garners its money off of students. Moreover, this corporation is not politically neutral; the chair of the last AGM is the chair of the federal New Democrat Party meetings. Many of the policies (such as the taxation of graduate students) have less to do with student representation than they do with advancing the careers of student politicos who hope to gain office in/through the NDP, or at the very least garner a cushy student union job or, better yet, a job with CFSS.

- reduce tuition fees whilst increasing revenue for public universities and colleges
- meet Canada's obligations to First Nations and Inuit peoples by increasing support by \$197 million
- create a federal Department of Post-Secondary Education and Research with an advisory council
- increase data collection for accountability and evidence-based decision-making

The proposal to shift spending from universal expenditures on tax credits and savings schemes to need-based grants adds significant progressivity to federal student financial aid. The model proposed here requires no new expense by the federal treasury, but is at least six times more generous than the allocation currently disbursed to provincial governments by the Millennium Scholarship Foundation.

I am looking at bringing in Vandana Shiva to Winnipeg for our Speaker Series. This event involves multiple stakeholders, volunteers and participants.

Vandana Shiva has fought for changes in the practice and paradigms of agriculture and food. Intellectual property rights, biodiversity, biotechnology, bioethics, genetic engineering are among the fields where Shiva has contributed intellectually and through activist campaigns. She has assisted grassroots organizations of the Green movement in Africa, Asia, Latin America, Ireland, Switzerland and Austria with campaigns against genetic engineering. In 1982, she founded the Research Foundation for Science, Technology and Ecology, which led to the

creation of Navdanya. Her book, "Staying Alive" helped redefine perceptions of third world women. Shiva has also served as an adviser to governments in India and abroad as well as non governmental organisations, including the International Forum on Globalisation, the Women's Environment & Development Organization and the Third World Network. Vandana Shiva participated in the Stock Exchange of Visions project in 2007. She is a councillor of the World Future Council.

In 1993, Shiva received the Right Livelihood Award for placing women and ecology at the heart of modern development discourse. Other awards she has received include the Global 500 Award of the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) in 1993, and the Earth Day International Award of the United Nations (UN) for her dedicated commitment to the preservation of the planet as demonstrated by her actions, leadership and by setting an example for the rest of the world.

- 1998: Commemorative Medal by Her Royal Highness Princess Maha Chakri Sirindhorn of Thailand on the occasion of the Celebration of the 18th World Food Day, organised by FAO Regional Office for Asia and the Pacific, Bangkok

Important notes

Senate committee on admission

- A proposal from the Faculty of Arts regarding the admission requirements for the newly proposed 90 credit hour undergraduate program: Bachelor of Arts (Integrated Studies).
- A proposal from the Faculty of Pharmacy requesting changes to the admission requirements for the Bachelor of Science (Pharmacy) program.

The current process for calculating AGPA is overly complex and a simplified process was felt by the committee to be desirable. In addition, in evaluating admission data, the committee noted the following:

- A trend for students to repeat multiple required core courses in an attempt to make their applications' more competitive. The committee felt that the act of repeating core courses simply inflated the AGPA, and did not reflect an applicant's academic ability.
- Students repeating core subjects are 'rewarded' in two ways: first, the core course average increases, and second, sessions with one or more repeated courses usually result in better sessional averages, and better sessions are more heavily weighted under the current AGPA formula.
- Students who needed to raise their admission AGPA by repeating several core courses tended to have the most difficulty achieving academic success in Pharmacy.
- The current process is not as discriminating as it might be. The AGPA for the 2008/2009 cohort lacked variability, ranging from 3.7 to 4.4.
