6. University Budget Cuts Update and Feedback

The University has recently proposed cutbacks of 4% for the 2015-16 academic year and additional cuts for the next two years after that. Faculties and units submitted their budgets in October responding to this request for cuts to be considered by the University. This information will then go to Board of Governors meeting in May 2015. Some groups on campus held an "anti-cuts" meeting to disseminate information about the U of M's budget and financial status.

An Anti-cuts Information Session-November 26

Summary: Professor Robert Chernomas (Economics) provided a broad overview of a political context of budget cuts and austerity trend happening throughout Canada. U of S was used as an example (Transform US), involving budget cuts and program prioritization, and people were fired/re-hired for criticism of various cuts. Students mobilized and were able to influence the process.

After analyzing the University's accounting practices for the last few years Professor Cameron Morrill (Accounting) discussed the current financial state of the University, trends over time, prioritization of those funds and compared this to how the University is presenting the information. Priorities appear to be focused on capital projects (e.g. constructing new buildings, infrastructure), investments and external relations (e.g. donors, fundraising, and advertising). UMGSA will invite Prof Morrill to make this presentation in January. From attendance at the meeting there seemed strong support from faculty, support staff and students to oppose the cuts.

Council members discussed the topic and questions were raised related to partnership in the anti-cuts organizing with other groups on campus, impact of deregulating tuition fees were proposed to try and balance the budget, impact of increased class sizes, larger workload, therefore less pay for the work, layoffs, the suggestion for direct lobbying the government for more support. There was the suggestion that more information was needed before getting actively involved in the organizing efforts.

BIRT UMGSA support an anti-cuts movement on campus

Laura Rempel, *President/* Joseph Dipple, *Native Studies*Rationale for motion is the ability to get started on these issues prior to the January Council

meeting so we can prepare, get more information for January, and build partnerships.

Vice President External proposed an amendment to delay the motion until January but was not seconded therefore it was dissolved.

Rationale for amendment was that students are busy, the university will be shutting down for the holidays. Concern about not enough information or time to move forward with this.

Some concerns were raised regarding being in a coalition with CFS-MB. Although CFS did initiate this, there are a lot of other coalition partners taking leadership and working together to share the work. The coalition's message is information sharing as a priority and asking the University for budget transparency. We can work with CFS-MB on anti-cuts activities we are comfortable with and not "be with them"; it doesn't mean we are compromising our position with CFS on other issues, etc.

BIRT the UMGSA conduct a fact-finding mission before supporting the "anti-cuts" movement.

8. Request for Feedback- FGS PhD Examiner Process

- A few concerns were raised regarding PhD students being delayed in completing their degrees (and having to pay for an additional term) due to the recent changes in the FGS process in selection of an external examiner.
- PhD process changed about a year and a half ago. In the past, the internal committee had a say on the external examiner but now, it has to go through the FGS. They chose 1 examiner from a list of 3 submitted by the internal examiner and student. These changes were made to be in line with other U15 graduate programs and to reduce potential bias or influence of internal advisors as the thesis goes out blind to examiner.
- We have heard from a few students that the new process is lengthy and make them stay longer and pay extra tuition fee.
- General process expected of the External Examiner is about a 1 month turn around for feedback. There is little in the way of FGS holding the examiner accountable to this timeline. They send weekly reminders and if it has been a month, they send an email to the Department Head to see if there are any contextual factors for the delay. If not they as the Head to send an email to the examiner.

Please let us know how widespread delays are for PhD students, if you heard of any issues within your department or if you have any recommendations for improving the process.

9. Bi-Annual Budget Report

9.1. Budget vs Actual- May to October 2014

We are doing well in terms of our budget. We have received student membership fees \$415,000 collected by the U of M, \$216,000 of which has gone to the operating budget, etc. In terms of the budget for the year we have not exceeded the budget except for some design expenditures such as printing. A question was asked regarding how fees were allocated for the Canadian Federation of Student fees were dealt with. We continue to collect the fees until the end of the 2017-18 academic year and hold them in trust in an External Relations Fund.
